At this time, short plays were used as "curtain-raisers" that were performed before a full length play. We revive that tradition at SCTC by following with a staged reading of "The Glass Menagerie" directed by "Suddenly, Last Summer" director Connie Norwood and featuring an African American cast. This play is usually produced with Caucasian actors but we bringing you this non-traditional cast to further explore the plays relevance to young and non-white audiences. We'll then look for your feedback in our short, post-show discussion moderated by STAGE magazine critic Jack Shaw.

We always want to challenge you with our work and bring you theatre rarely seen in the Philadelphia area. We hope that you will agree that this festival does just that.

#### ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Thomas Lanier "Tennessee" Williams was born March 26, 1911. The son of a traveling salesman and a clergyman's daughter, he lived in St. Louis from age 12. After attending several colleges he graduated from the University of Iowa (1938). He first won recognition for his group of one-act plays, American Blues (1939). Wider success came with The Glass Menagerie (1944) and mounted with A Streetcar Named Desire (1947, Pulitzer Prize; film, 1951), Camino Real (1953), and Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (1955, Pulitzer Prize; film, 1958). Two of his plays, Suddenly Last Summer (1958; film, 1959) and The Night of the Iguana (1961; film, 1964) will be performed this season at SCTC as part of our "Tenn X Ten" celebration. He also wrote the novel The Roman Spring of Mrs. Stone (1950; film, 1961) and the screenplays for The Rose Tattoo (1955, adapted from his 1951 play) and Baby Doll (1956). He is regarded as one of the greatest American playwrights. He died on February 25, 1983 at the Hotel Elysée in New York. SCTC will take you to that room on that night in this February's World Premiere of Tennessee's Final Curtain.
