DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Eugene O'Neill requires commitment from an audience, and he rewards it. Often considered America's greatest playwright, he masterfully weaves together the quirks and quests of different characters. More than most writers, he understands the spiritual dimension of humanity, our ultimate need for meaning, love, and especially forgiveness.

In A Moon for the Misbegotten, O'Neill picks up a story he began in A Long Day's Journey Into Night. There we see the inner workings of the Tyrone family, revolving around the father's dynamic personality and the mother's morphine addiction. It's a thinly veiled rendition of O'Neill's own family of origin.

This play takes place a number of years later. The parents have died, and Jim "Jamie" Tyrone (the fictional version of Eugene's older brother) now runs the family estate, but he is deeply troubled and very sick from years of alcohol abuse. In this play we meet the family that rents land on that estate and farms it – the Hogans, full of Irish wit and trickery.

Will Jim Tyrone ever find the love he needs, perhaps in the unlikely figure of Josie Hogan? And exactly what kind of love does he need? Is there any hope of redemption for "misbegotten" people like them . . . and like us? The mysterious moon and the spectacular dawn suggest that there could be.

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
ABOUT THE ACTORS

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

EUGENE O'NEILL (Playwright) (Born Oct. 16, 1888—died Nov. 27, 1953), foremost American dramatist and winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1936. His masterpiece, Long Day's Journey into Night (produced posthumously in 1956), is at the apex of a long string of areat plays, including Beyond the Horizon (1920), Anna Christie (1922), Strange Interlude (1928), Ah! Wilderness (1933), and The Iceman Cometh (1946). O'Neill was the first American dramatist to regard the stage as a literary medium and the only American playwright ever to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature. Through his efforts, the American theatre grew up during the 1920s, developing into a cultural medium that could take its place with the best in American fiction, painting, and music. Until his Beyond the Horizon was produced, in 1920, Broadway theatrical fare, apart from musicals and an occasional European import of quality, had consisted largely of contrived melodrama and farce. O'Neill saw the theatre as a valid forum for the presentation of serious ideas. For more than 20 years, both with such masterpieces as Desire Under the Elms, Mourning Becomes Electra, and The Iceman Cometh and by his inspiration to other serious dramatists, O'Neill set the pace for the blossoming of the Broadway theatre. He is regarded as one of America's areatest playwrights.

A DEDICATION

This production is dedicated to Fr. Michael Doyle, who, without his tireless effort and inspiration, there would be no South Camden Theatre Company or Waterfront South Theatre.

When I was selecting our first season here at Waterfront South Theatre I wanted to find a play to honor Fr. Doyle for all of his work, and, as he admires O'Neill greatly, this play was a perfect fit. SCTC brings "A Moon for the Misbegotten" to you in his honor.
